Re: Passage of the Children and Teens' Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA 2.0)

Dear Majority Leader Schumer, Speaker Johnson, Minority Leader McConnell, and Minority Leader Jeffries,

Today we write as a coalition of advocates dedicated to the mental and physical health, privacy, safety, and education of our nation's youth, urging you to pass the Children and Teens' Online Privacy Protection Act, also known as COPPA 2.0, without delay. With mere days remaining in this legislative session, it is imperative that Congress prioritize common sense privacy protections for children and teens by updating the decades-old Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) and passing COPPA 2.0 now.

COPPA 2.0 is an effective, widely supported, bipartisan update to its 25-year-old predecessor. It extends privacy protections to teens, implements strong data minimization principles, bans targeted advertising to covered minors, gives families greater control over their data, and strengthens the law to ensure covered entities cannot evade enforcement. American families urgently need these protections. Big Tech's business model relies on the collection of millions of

data points on children and teens, all to rake in record profits through design features that maximize engagement in order to sell targeted ads. The use of targeted advertising results in kids being shown ads for alcohol, tobacco, diet pills, or gambling sites. These risks are multiplied because social media platforms are designed to be addictive, so that kids will spend more time online. As the Surgeon General has advised, this misuse of young people's personal information has contributed to a <u>startling mental health crisis</u> among our youth, along with a myriad of online harms including sexual exploitation, rampant cyberbullying, and eating disorders. The data-driven business model is directly at odds with the health, safety, and privacy of our nation's children and teens, and Congress must act to put new safeguards in place.

We are thankful for the Senate's work in passing COPPA 2.0 as part of the Kids Online Safety and Privacy Act (KOSPA) by a vote of 91-3 on July 30, 2024. We are also thankful for the work of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, which approved COPPA 2.0 on September 18, 2024. COPPA 2.0 has longstanding and immense bipartisan support. America's children and families cannot wait any longer. This is your chance to protect kids and teens on the internet as it looks today. With our utmost respect, we ask that you include the strongest version of COPPA 2.0 in an end of the year package. The time is now for Congress to pass COPPA 2.0!
